Course Description

This course examines a broad range of key topics in social psychology. It is designed to help students to become familiar with the methods for studying social psychological constructs and the major theories in social psychology. Some of the topics to be covered include: understanding social influence, social cognition, and group dynamics.

This course surveys a wide range of areas of study within the field of social psychology. By the end of the course you should be:

- 1. able to identify and understand the social psychological perspective on psychological phenomenon and how it differs from perspectives in other areas of psychology and the social sciences.
- 2. able to identify and understand the major theoretical frameworks within social psychology (e.g., social learning theory, cognitive dissonance theory, etc.) and their real life applications (e.g., aggression).
- 3. knowledgeable of the types of research questions and research designs common in studies in this area, and able to critique research.

Exams in this course are open book. For this course, an open book exam means that the use of class notes and the textbook is permitted/is prohibited. The use of online resources and calculators is permitted/is prohibited. Students may/may not communicate with others about course material or the exam either in person or electronically during exams.

In-class Group Assignment. (10%) Group Presentation in Class

It is important for students to understand research methods in social psychology and apply their knowledge. This assignment is intended to help you to think about social psychological questions from a scientific perspective. Further, this assignment will foster effective communication through interaction. with others and oral communication. In groups of 4 students will develop a social psychology research question and preliminary proposal (i.e., rationale, minimal background on topic, and description of methods). Together they will present their work to the class in a 4-minute oral presentation with slides. Each person must be involved in speaking during the presentation. On Monday May 8th and Wednesday May 10th students will have class time to work on their assignment. Presentations will occur on Monday May 15th, taking up the majority of class time. Groups will be provided a group grade. Any group members who do not participate in their group's presentation without instructor approval will be given a 0%. With instructor approval those who are unable to attend in class for their presentation may be able to present with their group via zoom conferencing into the class.

Term 1, 2, and Final Exam

Three exams are scheduled for this course covering text and lecture material (including films). The first two exams are non-cumulative and will consist of multiple-choice questions. The final exam will be 2-hours in length. This final is cumulative and will consist of multiple-choice questions.

Term 1 exam: May 24th (overlapping with class time), term 2 exam: June 7th (overlapping with class time), final exam: TBD (during exam period).

All exams will be administered online through D2L. Students will have access to the online exam for 24 hours which will overlap directly with class time. As such, the Term 1 exam will become accessible on Tuesday May 23rd at 11:45am and close on Wednesday May 24th at 11:45am. The instructor will be available to answer any questions and provide support (via email) during the exam during regular class hours on Wednesday May 24th (9:00am- 11:45am). Accordingly, for the Term 2 exam, the exam will become accessible on Tuesday June 6th at 11:45am and close on Wednesday June 7th at 11:45am. Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: *Exceptional Performance*. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met*. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

Extra Research Participation Course Credit is Offered for this Course.

Course Credits for Research Participation (Max 2% of final grade)

Students in most psychology courses are eligible to participate in Departmentally approved research and earn credits toward their final grades. A maximum of two credits (2%) per course, including this course, may be applied to the student's final grade. Students earn 0.5% (0.5 credits) for each full 30 minutes of participation. The demand for timeslots may exceed the supply in a given term. Thus, students are not guaranteed that there will be enough studies available to them to meet their credit requirements. Students should seek studies early in the term and should frequently check for open timeslots. Students can create an account and participate in Departmentally approved research studies at http://ucalgary.sona-systems.com. The last day to participate in studies and to assign or reassign earned credits to courses is June 15, 2023.

Absence From Test/Exam

Makeup tests/exams are **NOT** an option without the approval of the instructor. Students who miss a test/exam have up to 24 hours to contact the instructor to ask for a makeup test/exam. It's the instructor's discretion if they will allow a make-up exam. Students who do not schedule a makeup test/exam with the instructor within this 24-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup test/exam.
