Course Description and Goals

This course will introduce students to many aspects related to child and adolescent development. Topics to be covered include biological, perceptual, cognitive, and social changes that take place during childhood and adolescence. As well, intelligence, language and emotional development, self-understanding, and moral understanding will be discussed. Finally, gender, family, and extra-familial influences on child and adolescent development will be examined. It is a chronological course starting at prenatal and ending at adolescence.

Prerequisites

Psychology 205 – Principles of Psychology

Evaluation

Two term tests and a final exam are scheduled. All are non-cumulative, multiple-choice tests based on lecture materials, readings in the textbook, group discussions, demonstrations, and videos. Not all test material will be covered in class, and some test material covered in class will not be covered in the text, so regular attendance is important for success in this course. Note that you are responsible for all assigned readings from the text even if the specific content has not been covered in lectures. Many test questions will involve critical thinking, a skill you will be given practice developing in class, so again it's to your advantage to come to class. The chapters covered on each exam are listed on the Tentative Lecture Schedule on this outline.

As stated in the University Calendar, it is at the instructor's discretion to round off either upward or downward to determine a final grade when the average of term work and final examinations is between two letter grades. To determine final letter grades, final percentage grades will be rounded up or down to the nearest whole percentage as appropriate (e.g., 89.50% will be rounded up to 90% = A, but 89.49% will be rounded down to 89% = A-, etc.)

Reappraisal of Grades

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (term paper, essay, test, etc.) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within 15 days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next 15 days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same. If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within 15 days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.

Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done

expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Students should examine sections of the University Calendar that present a Statement of Intellectual honesty and definitions and penalties associated with Plagiarism/Cheating/Other Academic Misconduct.

Academic Accommodation

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations. If you are a student with a documented disability who may require academic accommodation and have not registered with the Disability Resource Centre, please contact their office at 403-220-8237. Students who have not registered with the Disability Resource Centre are not eligible for formal academic accommodation. You are also required to discuss your needs with your instructor no later than 14 days after the start of this course.

Absence from an Exam

Make-up exams are NOT an option without an official University medical excuse (see the University Calendar). A completed Physician/Counselor Statement will be required to confirm absence from an exam for health reasons; the student will be required to pay any cost associated with the Physician/Counselor Statement. Students who miss an exam have 48 hours to contact the instructor and to schedule a makeup exam. Students who do not schedule a makeup exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup exam. At the instructor's discretion, a make-up exam may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from a regularly scheduled exam. Except in extenuating circumstances (documented by an official University medical excuse), a makeup exam must be written within 2 weeks of the missed exam.

Course Credits for Research Participation

Students in most psychology courses are eligible to participate in departmentally approved research and earn credits toward their final grades. A maximum of two credits (2%) per course, including this course, may be applied to an individual's final grade. Students earn 0.5% (0.5 credits) for each full 30 minutes of participation. The demand for timeslots may exceed the supply in a given term. Thus, students are not guaranteed that there will be enough studies available to them to meet their credit requirements. Students should seek studies early in the term and should frequently check for open timeslots. Students can create an account and participate in departmentally approved research studies at http://ucalgary.sona-systems.com. The last day to participate in research and allocate credits to courses is December 7th, 2009.
