## **Course Description and Goals**

Over the past few decades, attachment theory has emerged as one of the leading frameworks employed in the study of close relationships, personality processes, and social development. The theory is of interest to many as it addresses a wide range of issues, including the evolution and development of close relationships; the defensive regulation of thought, feeling and action, the role of mental representations in interpersonal behavior; and the processes underlying mental health. Moreover, attachment theory is compelling because it draws upon insights from a range of psychological perspectives, including developmental, social, personality, and evolutionary.

The objective of this course is to review theory and research on adult attachment and to discuss contemporary issues and debates in the field.

#### **Evaluation:**

**Exams (65% of final grade)**: Two mid-term exams, conducted during class time. The final exam will be scheduled during the final exam period. Exams are non-cumulative and will consist of multiple-choice, and short-long answer questions. Questions will be drawn from all materials (lectures, video clips) presented in class as well as the assigned readings. No electronic devices can be used during the exam period.

**Thought Papers (15% of final grade; 5% each):** You will complete three thought papers 2-3 pages double-spaced in length worth 5% each (max total = 15% of your mark). In these papers, you will discuss your response to some aspect(s) of the content covered in the course. Your thought paper should focus on insights, criticisms, and questions regarding a specific reading, or multiple readings. Your thought papers will be graded with respect to the following factors: (a) whether it was submitted on time, (b) the quality of your writing (i.e., clarity, grammar, coherence), and (c) the quality of your ideas (i.e., do they reflect a careful reading and consideration of the issues? Do they have the potential to generate productive discussion?).

**Essay (20%):** One research paper 8-10 pages double spaced (not including references) worth 20% of your final mark. You will be provided with a list of potential topics at the beginning of the term. Students may also write about a topic of their choice as long as they receive permission from me first. Further details will be provided in class. **Due in class Thursday April 11<sup>th</sup>, 2013.** 

**Submission of Assignments/Papers:** You are expected to hand in your printed assignments at the beginning of class on the assigned due dates. Electronic submissions will **not** be accepted. A 10% penalty will be assessed for each work day that the paper is late (including weekends). It is your responsibility to ensure that I receive the assignment on time. Late assignments may be handed in at the Psychology Office, A 275 (after hours, the green box outside this office).

## **Reappraisal of Grades**

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (e.g., term paper, essay, test) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within 15 days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next 15 days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same. If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within 15 days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.

#### **Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct**

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Students should examine sections of the University Calendar that present a Statement of Intellectual honesty and definitions and penalties associated with Plagiarism/Cheating/Other Academic Misconduct.

#### **Academic Accommodation**

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations. #### Absence From A Test/Exam

Makeup tests/exams are NOT an option without an official University medical excuse (see the University Calendar). A completed Physician/Counselor Statement will be required to confirm absence from a test/exam for health reasons; the student will be required to pay any cost associated with this Statement. Students who miss a test/exam have 48 hours to contact the instructor and to schedule a makeup test/exam. Students who do not schedule a makeup test/exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup test/exam. At the instructor's discretion, a makeup test/exam may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from a regularly scheduled test/exam. Except in extenuating circumstances (documented by an official University medical excuse), a makeup test/exam must be written within 2 weeks of the missed test/exam.

#### Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy (FOIP) Act

The FOIP legislation disallows the practice of having student's retrieve tests and assignments from a public place. Therefore, tests and assignments may be returned to students during class/lab, or during office hours, or via the Department Office (Admin 275), or will be made available only for viewing during exam review sessions scheduled by the Department. Tests and assignments will be shredded after one year. Instructors should take care to not link students' names with their grades, UCIDs, or other FOIP-sensitive information.

### **Course Credits for Research Participation (Max 2% of final grade)**

Students in most psychology courses are eligible to participate in Departmentally approved research and earn credits toward their final grades. A maximum of two credits (2%) per course, including this course, may be applied to the student's final grade. Students earn 0.5% (0.5 credits) for each full 30 minutes of participation. The demand for timeslots may exceed the supply in a given term. Thus, students are not guaranteed that there will be enough studies available to them to meet their credit requirements. Students should seek studies early in the term and should frequently check for open timeslots.
